Synopsis

Set in the picturesque village of Berd, the collection traces the interconnected lives of its inhabitants, seemingly unremarkable villagers who go on about their lives, tending to their daily tasks, engaging in their quotidian squabbles, and celebrating small joys amid a luscious, beautiful local landscape. Yet their seemingly unremarkable existence in a setting imbued with a deliberate sense of being suspended in time and space belies an unspeakable tragedy: every character in Abgaryan's stories must contend with the unbearable burden of loss that they have suffered during the war between Armenia and Azerbaijan in the early 1990s.

The war itself rages largely off the book's pages and appears only in small and fragmented flashbacks, and Abgaryan's stories focus instead on the war's aftermath, portraying the different ways in which the survivors work, as individuals and as a community, to find a way forward. For some, the toll is a psychological one, as the opening vignette introduces the reader to Zanazan, a beautiful young woman who has lost her unborn child, her husband, and her ability to speak to enemy shelling, and who now lives in the care of her elderly

mother-in-law. The middle-aged Metaksia visits her stepson's grave and chats with him as if they were sitting across from each other at a dinner table. Agnessa, whose ill-fated desire to keep her daughter warm in a bomb shelter has cost her not only her own limbs but also the life of her child finds love and a chance at redemption with a new family. Lusine, who barely recalls her mother, abducted and brutally murdered by the enemy, receives, as an engagement present, the last surviving rug woven by her mother. Anichka, whose entire family has been brutally murdered, forges a platonic relationship with a widower whose son has been left incapacitated by yet another act of senseless violence.

The characters in Abgaryan's book have lived through unimaginable loss, but their sadness is described as cathartic, engendering hope where all hope must be lost. The book, set up as 31 interconnected short stories, has no single protagonist; instead, the book is centered around the resilience of the human spirit and its ability to soar above. Written in Abgaryan's signature prose style that weaves elements of Armenian folkloric tradition into its prose, the book si-

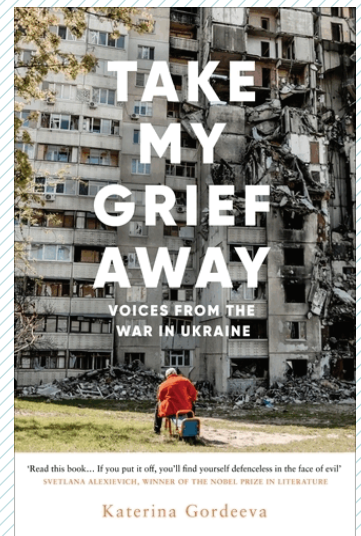

she was gone, one of Kadyrov's tanks fired at her apartment, where her husband and other dog were. They died.

— Larisa, whose perception of plastic water bottles has forever changed, tainted by the traumatic ordeal she endured at the hands of kidnappers, who captured on her way to visit her mother-in-law in the occupied territory.

— Ilya, a guy missing a leg. He volunteered for the Security Service of Ukraine and was severely injured by a mine.

— Rita, a young woman hailing from Irpen, has been unable to celebrate her birthday (February 24th) since the onset of the war. Instead, on her birthday in 2023, she takes a momentous step by marrying a man from South Korea, forging a new beginning in a distant land.

— Lyuba, a pregnant woman who couldn't crouch down while under fire.

— Inga from Mariupol, who lost her son in the bombing and her husband in a war action. She is now in Spain, staying in a popular touristic area, but has never been to the seaside. She was hired as a housekeeper — so she tidies up and irons clothes for the owners who would never show up.

— Lena, a woman whose husband was killed by Russian soldiers, though she was saved by Russian soldiers.

— Kora, a dog who was saved in Bucha.

In a fractured near-future, a paranoid dictator, a determined biochemist, and a disillusioned data analyst face unsettling animal behaviour that challenge their notions of power, empathy, and control.

Animal Tested is a dystopian satire set in a near-future where three storylines intersect. In Moscow, a strongman ruler known as "Coach" becomes increasingly unstable as intelligent crows target him and his regime. In Atlanta, Lex, a biochemist, discovers lab rats exhibiting human-like intelligence and, despite resistance, attempts to communicate with them using brain-computer interfaces. In Berlin, Rainer, a data analyst, secretly rebels against a technocratic regime by breeding outlawed chihuahuas and manipulating public happiness metrics. As these plots converge through high-stakes virtual meetings between Moscow, Berlin, and D.C., the stability of global power hangs by a thread, exposing the human limits of control.

In the novel's alternative near future three seemingly unrelated plotlines intertwine into a tight knot.

In Moscow, a strongman ruler – whom his intimates call Coach and others are instructed not to address directly – faces a growing problem with crows. The priests are the first to be attacked by the aggressive and unusually intelligent birds, but Coach himself appears to be their ultimate target. The ruler's entourage reads his erratic and violent response towards birds as a sign of declining mental health and, more importantly, of weakness. An attempted coup d'état finds Coach sequestered in his fortress residence with his disenchanted mistress and their child. They, too, have been forced to hide indoors from aggressive crows.

The Coach and his family are placed under home arrest, while the guards undermine his authority by continuously provoking both him and his family, trying to make him snap. But to Coach himself, the only way to escape the nightmare is to join and head up the mystical forces aligned against him, to fly with the crows – and to get a message to a loyal general. By the time the coup is defeated, Coach perceives himself simultaneously as man and crow, ready to wage his wars in ways no ordinary man could ever imagine.

In Atlanta, Lex, a young biochemist at a medium-sized pharma company, leads a small team conducting obesity pill research. Lex' unusual emotional intelligence and gentle hands make her the favorite of the lab rats used in the experiments. Eager to make contact with Lex – and no one else – the rats display various near-human behaviors. When the researcher shares her experience with colleagues and her superior, Cheol, she is immediately suspected of burnout and drug use. Not to be deterred by the institutional resistance and the unfamiliar scientific terrain, Lex smuggles in forbidden equipment and embarks on a series of experiments with a brain-computer interface to decipher the message the rats want to communicate. When she

finally succeeds, the message is one of unspeakable suffering. Fired from the firm when Cheol covets her findings, Lex takes her program to academia and her results to the public, finding herself at the head of a powerful movement driven by compassion not only for animals but for victims of all forms of oppression.

In Berlin, Rainer Radtke runs one of several happiness models for EGAL, a think-tank-like organization that has been running Germany since, in the middle of a pandemic, the political establishment peacefully handed over power to the experts. Rainer's job is to track hundreds of real-time data feeds and suggest policy measures to make sure the population's happiness level doesn't drop below 70%. Rainer himself, however, no longer believes in scientific governance since a city planning decision resulted in the demolition of his childhood home and the death of his father. He rebels by running an underground pub in a gloomy village an hour's drive from Berlin and by breeding chihuahuas in defiance of a nationwide dog ban.
